

## **2022 Review of the Compendium of Old British Bridges - Addendum**

The review was initiated because I have been made aware of errors in the 2021 version of the Compendium, and have acquired new information, particularly concerning qualifying bridges, unidentified until now. Two matters have influenced the chosen adjustment. Firstly, the surprisingly large number of newly identified qualifying bridges; there are 25. Secondly, the pamphlet 'Some Recent Investigations of the Historic Stone Bridges of the British Isles', is strongly linked to the 2021 version of the Compendium, and was published in September 2021.

Accordingly, the 2021 version of the Compendium is being reviewed, to remove errors, and make other appropriate changes of form and style, but the content will be otherwise unchanged, so that it remains aligned to the aforementioned pamphlet. Changes will be made progressively over some weeks.

However, this addendum has been added, containing the following items, reachable by way of the links;

(i) A set of information sheets, one for each of the 25 additional historic bridges, adhering to the format used previously.
